
# Kathryn Macnaughton



## Background and world context:

Kathryn Macnaughton is a graphic designer turned painter, based in Toronto, Canada. Macnaughton graduated from Ontario College of Art and Design in 2007 and has been exhibiting artwork both in Canada and abroad since 2010.







## **Critical Study:**

Kathryn Macnaughton's artwork is heavily influenced by the female body. Macnaughton states in an interview that she believes the geometric shapes, which often take on the shape of the female form, in much of her work comes from having a background in design work. Her artwork, primarily done in acrylic, contradicts itself with flat, flush surfaces as well as textured, lively areas. The artwork is abstract yet there is a sense of familiarity in almost all of her paintings.

"The female figure is very important in my work, and the shapes that are created. When I went to school for illustration, I did graphic design, and I think a lot of the influence comes from graphic shapes, which take on the shape of the female form."-Macnaughton

#### **Cultural Frame:**


Being that a Macnaughton uses the female figure as an influence in her work, do you think it makes a difference that she is a woman who painted these?

Is there a sense of spontaneity in Macnaughtons work? Or is every piece planned out?

"I'm never satisfied. I guess that's a good thing because I am always trying to do better work—I'm completely addicted to it. It feels like I'm always trying to figure it out. Yesterday, I spent twelve hours in the studio, not even leaving once, from 8:30 AM to 8:30 at night. I get addicted to it because I'm so hard [on myself]. ## Historical context and questions related:

Look at the artwork of Russian artist, Wassily

Kandinsky. Kandinsky is known to be a pioneer in the abstract art movement.

How do the two artists use line the same? Different?

The two artists use color very differently, how does this affect the mood of their pieces?

Do you think that both of these artists work would look best represented at a larger scale or smaller scale?

How do these artists similarly use negative space?

Look at the artwork of Italian artist, Davide Balliano.

How do these two artists use color differently? (Other than the fact that Balliano primarily works in a gray scale)

How do these to artists similarly use shape in their pieces?

Would you consider both of these artists do create abstract work?

How do these two pieces evoke different emotions for the viewer?

#### **Art Making/Research:**

- Paint a canvas background, let dry, paint a geometric image over top, let dry, and keep repeating the process
- Create textures with paint, scan digitally, and create a digital composition using painted pieces
- Mix a still life line drawing with another drawing that is colorful and/or realistic
- Create a line drawing, fill in the "shapes" with a limited color palette

#### Vocab:

Abstract: distortion, no pictorial representation

Acrylic: fast drying paint that is suspended in acrylic polymer emulsion

Texture: the feel and surface of an object

Line drawing: a drawing done in only lines, usually thin lines
